Key themes in 2021:

Cultural Route of the Council of Europe – explore Europe's Thermal Heritage through our member towns and regions.

European Year of Rail 2021– many of the earliest railways went to the spa resorts of the 19th century. Some were built to transport growing numbers of spa guests, and some towns experienced a revival when the railways arrived. In the European Year of Rail 2021, this year's focus is on rail as a sustainable means of travel, and as an authentic spa town experience.

Thermal towns as places of wellbeing – looking forward to the annual *European Thermal Heritage Day* in October on the subject of "Therapeutic Landscapes", the landscape surrounding our towns can be used for walking, hiking, ski-ing, cycling, boating – fresh air, exercise and wellbeing are part of the spa town offer, adding value to the thermal waters.

Great Spas of Europe



Several of EHTTA's members are also part of the Great Spas of Europe, a group of eleven spa towns across seven countries that has been nominated to UNESCO for inscription on the World Heritage List as a transnational serial 'property'.

The property – eleven places developed around mineral springs - provides exceptional testimony to a complex, and unprecedented urban typology and cultural movement - the spa town. The Great Spas of Europe marks the greatest development of this phenomenon.
